Pretty Coloured Gold -John Milner

Most people think of the colour of gold (Au) as yellow, white or rose; these colours being the traditional ones seen in jewellery shops. These are **alloys** of gold with various metals.

Yellow Gold

Pure gold is a slightly reddish yellow and at 24ct is highly malleable and very soft, with 22ct gold looking very similar in colour, but proving less malleable. More usual are the 18ct, 14ct, 10ct and 9ct paler shades of yellow gold. The lower carat content makes these stronger, more durable and thus more suitable for use in jewellery. Yellow gold is traditionally alloyed with copper and silver.

Examples of the common alloys for 18ct yellow gold are - 18ct yellow gold: 75% gold, 12.5% copper, 12.5% silver 18ct yellow (darker) gold: 75% gold, 15% copper, 10% silver.

White Gold

White gold is an alloy of gold (Au) and at least one white metal (usually nickel, silver, or palladium). Like yellow gold, the purity of white gold is given in carats. The alloys used in the jewellery industry are gold, palladium, silver and gold, nickel, copper, zinc. Palladium and nickel act as primary bleaching agents for gold; zinc acts as a secondary bleaching agent to attenuate the colour of copper.

A common white gold formula consists of 90% gold and 10% nickel.

The nickel used in some white gold alloys can cause an allergic skin reaction when worn over long periods, because of this, many countries do not use nickel in their white gold formulae, others use rhodium plating.

Rose Gold

Rose gold is a gold, copper alloy, also known as red gold and pink gold, and was popular in Russia at the beginning of the nineteenth century. It was once called Russian gold, a term no longer used

The difference between red, rose, and pink gold is the copper content: the higher the copper content, the stronger the red colour. Red gold uses the most copper, followed by rose gold, with pink gold having the lowest copper content. Examples of the common alloys for 18ct rose gold, 18ct red gold, 18ct pink gold, and 12ct red gold are -

18ct red gold: 75% gold, 25% copper

18ct rose gold: 75% gold, 22.25% copper, 2.75% silver 18ct pink gold: 75% gold, 20% copper, 5% silver

12ct red gold: 50% gold and 50% copper.

Spangold

Some gold, copper, aluminium alloys form a fine surface texture at heat treatment, yielding an interesting spangling effect.

Green Gold

Green gold was known to the Lydians as long ago as 860 BC under the name electrum. It is a naturally occurring alloy of gold and silver and actually appears as greenish-yellow rather than green.

Grev Gold

Grey gold alloys are usually made from gold and palladium. A cheaper alternative, which does not use palladium, is made by adding silver, manganese, and copper to the gold in specific ratios.

Now for the fun stuff -

Alloys are not the only types of 'gold' on the market. There is another gold group known as **intermetallic**.

The intermetallics have the formula AuX₂ and are brittle. They include Purple and Blue Gold.

Purple gold (also called amethyst gold and violet gold) is an alloy of gold and aluminium (AuAl₂). Gold content in AuAl₂ is around 79% and so Purple Gold can be referred to as 18ct gold. Created in 2000, its discovery is resultant from research by Aspial-Lee Hwa of Singapore. Check this out when next passing through Singapore airport.

Blue gold is an alloy of gold and either gallium or indium. Gold, indium contains 46% gold (about 11ct) and 54% indium, forming the compound AuIn₂.

A cautionary note – both metals are very brittle, easily fractured and further to this, direct contact of blue and purple gold elements with skin may result in metal leaching and discoloration of the metal surface, however they are highly sought after and rather beautiful.

So a new year begins and another opportunity to enjoy the Victorian fossicking areas.

I am arranging a Mount Shadwell quarry visit in Mortlake for some time in May.

Any club members can visit this quarry of their own accord on a Friday, Saturday or Sunday by contacting the Mortlake Information Centre and arranging with them.

I was able to visit Mooralla near the Grampians before Christmas.

This is a smoky quartz area that requires deep digging and so cannot be done in a day.

The smoky quartz found can be of excellent quality.

There is some interest in us visiting this area so there may be a trip arranged in the second half of this year for a shared hole exercise so people do not have to spend days digging as the mineral layer is about a metre or more down in places.

I will be checking out new places on the Friday so if club members wish to meet on the Friday I will need prior notice.

Field trip Ethics

- You must have a Current Victoria Miner's Right.
- Before entering private property, be it grazing, farming, mining, quarrying etc, permission must be obtained from the owner, lessee, manager or other responsible person, for prospecting, mining, collecting gemstones or camping.
- When permission has been obtained, members will obey any direction, restriction, order, advice or precaution given by the person in charge of the property.
- Ensure that gates of properties are left as found, shut or open.
- Stock, including domestic animals, are not to be interfered with under any circumstances.
- Firearms and explosives shall not be taken on field trips.
- Do not take pets on field trips.
- Leave an area as you find it. Fill in

all holes and remove all litter. Be sure that gutters and drains are clear.

- Do not dig in banks of streams.
- Do not dig in or foul streams which are part of a water catchment area.
- Do not damage or undermine trees or other vegetation.
- Keep off crops and tilled land unless permission is granted. Use furrows to walk in if you must traverse tilled land.
- Do not remove excessive amounts of material. Take only enough for your personal use, not for commercial purposes.
- Extinguish all fires by covering them with soil. Don't chop trees to make your fire
- Use fallen and broken limbs. Do not light fires when restrictions are in force, including TOTAL FIRE BAN DAYS.

A reminder that if you would like to fossick a"Miners Right" is required.

A Miner's Right allows the holder to search for, and take possession of, any mineral located on many areas of public land, or, on private land with the landholder's prior consent. Only basic non-powered hand tools (i.e. pick, shovel, sieve, etc.) can be used. This can be purchased online at https://checkout.payments.com.au/minersRight/

Field Trip Report—Robin Jongebloed cont

A Miners Right is mandatory and can be purchased by visiting the Geovic Victorian Government web site.

There is also a list of creeks that cannot be prospected in on the website. There is a notice on the notice board for members to show their interest so I can communicate as the time draws near.

I normally fossick in the gravel banks or along the creek in shallow areas for gold, crystals and small zircons etc.

So anyone with a reasonable level of fitness will find it ok. It is up to members to be self-sufficient .(I will be available to help each day)

Some of the gear I take includes the following:

First aid kit

- Water
- Mobile phone or some form of communication, although some parts of the creek does not have reception.
- Light colored top or high vis.
- Map can be found on the web
- Water Boots or non-slip shoes (waders are not required and I do not encourage members going into deep water)
- Gold pan(I use green or blue pans but this is a personal choice)
- Sieve 1/8th or ¼ inch or larger for a pan or bucket
- Bucket
- Spray bottle for spraying gravels.
- Digging tool(Shovel etc)
- Gloves as required.
- Plastic sucker bottle to suck up the fine gold etc (I have a couple spare for the day but these can be purchased on EBay or from Minlab Stores)

I have a purpose built pump similar to a yabby pump used to collect bait to suck the fine gold or zircons off of the granite bedrock.

So if you have a yabby pump it is worth bringing along. I have one pump that can be shared as required.

I do not guarantee any members will find anything but since storms may have turned up the gravels there is a reasonable chance of success. The area around Wangaratta and Beechworth is good for a holiday with plenty to see and do if members so desire.

Findings & Windings:

Continuing along the colour/frequency spectrum in this months' newsletter, we move on to the colour orange. The colour dates back as far as ancient Egypt and Medieval times. The Earth's minerals have been used in earthenware, art (Renior, Van Gogh, Pre-Raphaelites), political/religious propaganda as well as for modern day safety. Orange was the colour of William III of Orange's rebel flag in the 1570s, who became the King of England (from James II). It was the colour of Protestantism in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries.

ORANGE

Terracotta - "Earthenware clays are formed from sedimetary clays, which contain many organic and mineral impurities....that determine the characteristic colour of the clay. The colour...associated with terracotta is a rich red-brown, which is due to the presence of iron oxide in the clay that, when fired in an oxygen-rich atmosphere, produces the distinctive red colour. The presence of other minerals, the firing temperature and the atmosphere in the kiln all contribute to the final colour"

Cadmium orange - a synthetic pigment made of cadmium sulfide (a by-product of zinc mining), that occurs rarely in nature in the mineral greenockite. It is made by replacing some of the sulphur with selenium, and was discovered in 1817.

Crocoite - Chrome orange is a basic lead chromate which was introduced as a paint pigment in 1809. Now obsolete, it was discovered by Louis Nicolas in 1797. The painter Renior used this pigment in his work: The Seine at Asnieres (1875).

Orpiment - A deep-coloured, orange-yellow arsenic sulfide mineral with formula As_2S_3 . It is found in volcanic fumaroles, low-temperature hydrothermal veins, and hot springs and is formed both by sublimation and as a byproduct of the decay of another arsenic mineral, realgar. This bright orange was used from antiquity to the end of the nineteenth century. Despite the high toxicity, it was a favourite of the Impressionist painters.

Uses of Orange:

Life Rafts, Life Jackets, Hi-Vis wear, Astronauts, Signage, Prisoners.
