Paul Alexander Mokume Gane (木目金)ring

Paul Alexander has experimented with the technique called Mokume Gane, which is a way of layering different col-



oured precious metals, fusing them together to fom a billet, that can then be manipulated to form a decorative object. Originating in japan, the word means "Wood Grain Metal", it was first used to produce decorative sword fittings, and first used in the 17th Century.

Developed by Denbei Shoami, in the Akita prefecture, it usually uses softer metals and alloys, it uses a stacked billet of metals that are then heated up until they are on the verge of melting, then the surfaces of the metals then bond together. The metal is then often rolled and relayered to increase the number of layers.

After the use of swords fell in the 19th century, the technique fell into disuse, until Tiffany and Co, under the direction of Edward C. Moore began to experiment with the technique, culminating in the 1878 Paris Exhibition with what was called the "Japanesque" silver, which won the Grand Prize.

Paul notes a couple of points. It is important to ensure that the surface touching the skin should be silver or gold, as otherwise it is not good for you.

Field trip Ethics

- You must have a Current Victoria Miner's Right.
- Before entering private property, be it grazing, farming, mining, quarrying etc, permission must be obtained from the owner, lessee, manager or other responsible person, for prospecting, mining, collecting gemstones or camping.
- When permission has been obtained, members will obey any direction, restriction, order, advice or precaution given by the person in charge of the property.
- Ensure that gates of properties are left as found, shut or open.
- Stock, including domestic animals, are not to be interfered with under any circumstances.
- Firearms and explosives shall not be taken on field trips.
- Do not take pets on field trips.
- Leave an area as you find it. Fill in all holes and remove all litter. Be sure that gutters and drains are clear.
- Do not dig in banks of streams.
- Do not dig in or foul streams which are part of a water catch-

ment area.

- Do not damage or undermine trees or other vegetation.
- Keep off crops and tilled land unless permission is granted.
 Use furrows to walk in if you must traverse tilled land.
- Do not remove excessive amounts of material. Take only enough for your personal use, not for commercial purposes.
- Extinguish all fires by covering them with soil. Don't chop trees to make your fire
- Use fallen and broken limbs. Do not light fires when restrictions are in force, including TOTAL FIRE BAN DAYS.

A reminder that if you would like to fossick a "Miners Right" is required.

A Miner's Right allows the holder to search for, and take possession of, any mineral located on many areas of public land, or, on private land with the landholder's prior consent. Only basic non-powered hand tools (i.e. pick, shovel, sieve, etc.) can be used. This can be purchased online at https://

Welcome to 2020 which promises to be an important year in the history of our club.

Last year 2019 was a year of change for the Diamond Valley Gem Club ,it's been a year in which to plan for the future in which we have a "new clubhouse" with new equipment and work stations to allow our members to make whatever they desire with their newly acquired skills from our courses .

By all measures 2019 has been a successful year, we have now more members, our gem show was from a financial position the most successful we have held and this has allowed all of our equipment to be put in good working order with spare motors available in the cabbing room and all of our 7 saws in the Saw room in good working order while our faceting machines have been well used and well maintained.

Our financial position is as strong as it has ever been and with the club receiving 2 grants , the first for a complete replacement of our hot water system throughout the club house, now providing warm water to all our cabbing machines , the second grant for gemological equipment to identify gem stones should be fully implemented within the forthcoming month .

None of these achievements have naturally occurred, it is thanks to the many members who have worked to achieve change while maintaining a happy ,well run and well-resourced club.

Sapphire facts from the Sapphire Fields of Queensland

Did you know?

- 1. Sapphires were first reported in the Sapphire gem fields of Australia by John Archibald Richardson in the 1870s
- 2. By 1970 Australia was producing over 80% of the world's Sapphires
- 3. Sapphires are one of the most highly prized gems in the world
- 4. Natural Sapphires are second only to Diamond on the Mohs scale of hardness (There are synthetic stones harder than Sapphire)
- 5. Sapphires crystallize in the trigonal system showing a six sided cross section
- 6. They are generally found in gem gravels well away from their area of geological origin
- 7. Sapphire is the name given to the coloured gem variety of the mineral corundum (Al²O³)
- 8. Corundum comes in all colours including colourless (if that can be called colour?)
- 9. Red corundum is called Ruby
- 10. Australian Sapphires generally come in the colours yellow, green and blue, however it is the yellow sapphire that is most highly prized
- 11. Multi coloured Sapphires are known s Parti-Coloured Sapphires
- 12. Australia also produces Star Sapphires, generally of bronze or blackish colour showing a 3-ray, 6-pointed star under light
- 13. Sapphires are the birth stone for the month of September and are the 45th Anniversary stone
- 14. Some famous Australian sapphires include:
 - The Pride of Queensland the largest cut yellow Sapphire in the world weighing in at 169 carats
 - The Tomahawk Tiger a parti-coloured crystal of over 82 carats
 - The Black Star of Queensland a Star Sapphire weighing an incredible 1,156 carats, recently offered for sale at over \$90 million
 - Four large sapphires carved as the heads of American Presidents weighing more than 1,700 carats each. These are housed in the Oval Office, Washington DC.

Finally, a little caution to fossickers in the Sapphire fields – DO NOT throw away any unidentified stones. One may prove to be the next famous Australian Sapphire.
